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Executive Summary

In 1967, the Hawai'i State Legislature created the Crime Victim Compensation Commission (the "Commission") to mitigate the financial impact suffered by victims of violent crime. The Commission disburses funds to pay un-reimbursed expenses for crime-related losses experienced by victims who suffer physical or emotional injury, or death, as the result of a violent crime. During Fiscal Year ("FY") 2006, the Commission processed over 1,357 compensation payments, including 784 new applications.

The Commission continues to pursue its mission to provide each claimant with compassionate and timely service. The Commission actively collaborates with numerous public and private agencies dedicated to serving crime victims as part of its efforts to continuously improve the delivery of victim compensation services.

Commission projects include the Mass Violence and Terrorism Response Project, the Medical Expense Reduction Project, the Restitution Recovery Project, and the National Association of VOCA ("Victims of Crime Act") Assistance Administrators Strategic Planning Project.

The Mass Violence and Terrorism Response Project (the "Response Project") seeks to integrate compensation and victim services into the mass violence and terrorism response protocols of the County and State Incident Command Response Model. The Response Project also facilitates Commission coordination with the members of the Hawai'i Volunteer Organizations Active in Disaster ("VOAD") to support a more effective response strategy and to reduce duplication of services for victims of mass violence and terrorism.

The Medical Expense Reduction Project (the "Expense Reduction Project") seeks to reduce and contain increasing medical costs in cases with uninsured crime victims by: 1) requesting that medical providers accept payment of 70% of the fees charged (a 30% reduction) as payment in full; and 2) in cases where total medical expenses incurred exceed the statutory maximum award of \$20,000.00, negotiate with various medical providers to each accept a proportionate payment (maximum award divided proportionately between all medical providers) as payment in full.

The Restitution Recovery Project (the "Restitution Project") collects restitution payments from inmates and parolees and disburses those funds to the crime victims. As a result of the Restitution Project, many more crime victims will receive reimbursement from offenders for their crime-related expenses. These increased payments will hold the offender accountable for the financial losses inflicted upon the victim of their crime and the offender will begin to develop a sense of self-respect and pride in righting the wrongs they have committed. The Commission will request that the Legislature make this Project permanent in the 2007 session by the establishment of a permanent position count.

The National Association of VOCA Assistance Administrators provided funding to develop a Strategic Plan to enhance delivery of victim services in Hawai'i. The University of Hawai'i Public Policy Center published the Strategic Plan in October of 2005. The Strategic Plan identified four underserved crime victim populations: elderly persons; immigrants or persons with limited English language proficiency; persons with disabilities; and visitors to Hawai'i. One

of the objectives of the Strategic Plan is to enable individuals from various agencies to better serve the target populations. To that end, the Commission participated in the Visitor Crime Awareness Training Conference in FY06, and in the 2006 Disabilities Access Conference. The Commission also collaborated with the Visitor Aloha Society of Hawai'i – Oahu ("VASH") and the Department of the Attorney General Criminal Justice Data Center to establish a protocol to provide temporary personal identification to visitor crime victims whose personal identification has been stolen.


Achieving, and maintaining, a consistent and adequate source of non-tax revenue to underwrite the costs of compensating crime victims, and to pay operating expenses, remains the most important issue facing the Commission. The Commission has not received any general funds from the State for several budget cycles, and now relies solely on non-tax revenue and matching federal funds. The primary source of non-tax revenue for the Commission is the mandatory crime victim compensation fee (the "Compensation Fee"). In 1998, the Legislature established the Compensation Fee and directed that it be assessed against all criminal offenders, with the ability to pay, by the Judiciary to provide a reliable funding base to support the Commission's mission to help restore crime victims who suffer from financial and emotional loss.

The Commission estimates that there has been a shortfall of more than one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) in revenue collections (the "Revenue Collection Shortfall") since the Compensation Fee was enacted by the Legislature. Court surveys conducted by Commission staff indicated that some judges were not assessing the Compensation Fee in all eligible cases. The impact of the Revenue Collection Shortfall since the Compensation Fee was enacted is to deprive the Commission of its ability to ensure adequate compensation to victims of violent crime in Hawai'i.

Despite the legislative mandate, and numerous high level meetings with Judiciary management and staff, some judges remain unwilling to order the Compensation Fee in all eligible cases. To address the Revenue Collection Shortfall created by the continuing failure of judges to order the Compensation Fee in all eligible cases, the Commission was compelled to request that the Legislature increase the amount of the Compensation Fee. Legislation was introduced during the 2005 legislative session requesting an increase in the Compensation Fee by ten dollars (\$10) in each category of offenses. Act 144 of the 2005 session increased the Compensation Fee by five dollars (\$5) in all categories of offenses.

Even with this increase in the Compensation Fee, the Commission has observed only a small increase in Compensation Fee revenue. Additional court monitoring has demonstrated that some judges are still not ordering the Compensation Fee in all eligible cases.

The Commission will continue to monitor the incidence of the assessment and collection of the Compensation Fee by the Judiciary. Dedicating resources to court monitoring is necessary to ensure that there is sufficient funding to provide adequate compensation to violent crime victims in Hawai'i, and to ensure the continuing fiscal self-sufficiency of the Commission.



Mission Statement

"The mission of the Crime Victim Compensation Commission is to equitably and efficiently provide crime victims with the services due to them under Hawai'i law. In doing so, the Commission treats every victim and survivor with dignity and respect, acknowledging the tremendous impact that violent crime has upon crime victims and our society."

Overview and History

The Hawai'i State Legislature created the Commission in 1967, making it the third agency of its kind in the nation. Hawai'i's program was established to pay un-reimbursed expenses to victims who suffer physical or emotional injury, or death, as the result of a violent crime. Hawai'i also recognizes the need to pay compensation to acknowledge the pain and suffering of crime victims. The Commission provides the State with an effective and fiscally efficient vehicle through which to acknowledge victims of violent crimes.

Between 1967 and 2002, the primary source of funding was State general funds appropriated through the Legislature. Beginning in FY03, no Hawai'i State taxpayer funds are expended to operate the Commission. Commission non-tax funding is achieved through the following means:

- Compensation Fees assessed by judges against convicted offenders
- Court-ordered restitution paid by offenders to reimburse the Commission for compensation previously paid to victims
- 10% of all Hawai'i inmate wages
- Interest income from funds on deposit
- Federal VOCA funds the Commission receives a sixty percent (60%) match from VOCA for every State dollar expended to compensate victims of violent crime

Since its creation, the Commission has processed over 18,000 applications for compensation from people who have been victims of violent crimes in Hawai'i. Currently, the Commission receives about 1,000 applications, and awards approximately one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00), annually. Awards assist the victims with medical costs, lost wages, funeral expenses, and counseling costs that are not covered by any other source.

In order for a victim to be eligible for compensation, the incident must be reported to law enforcement without undue delay, and the Commission must receive the application for compensation within eighteen (18) months of the date of the incident. The applicant must provide the Commission with documentation such as medical bills, insurance statements, pay stubs, and/or income tax returns in order to substantiate the claim for compensation.

Annual Activity

Operations

During FY06, the Commission received 784 new applications for compensation and processed 1,357 new and ongoing applications. The Commission gives each application full consideration and works diligently with every applicant to ensure accurate and efficient claims processing.

FY03 was the first year that the Commission operated without expending any Hawai'i taxpayer

dollars. This means that all funds come from the non-tax sources listed above on Page 3 in this Report. It is, therefore, essential that the Compensation Fee be assessed and collected by the Judiciary from all eligible cases. The Commission necessarily must rely on cooperation from the Judiciary to assess and collect the Compensation Fee from convicted offenders in all eligible cases.

It is vitally important to note that Hawai'i now receives a sixty percent (60%) federal match from VOCA. Therefore, every dollar of Compensation Fees not assessed by judges against, and collected from, all eligible convicted offenders is a compounded loss of one dollar and sixty cents due to the concomitant loss of the sixty percent federal match.

Compensation In Action - Compensation for Crime Related Medical Expenses

Case #1 – Domestic Abuse

The Victim in this case was assaulted by her brother after she intervened when he was assaulting

"I was ashamed to go out of the house after the assault. The right side of my face was shrunken, deformed and discolored where they had to remove my eyeball. It was very hard on my kids when I didn't want to go out because I couldn't be with them. I could not afford a prosthetic eyeball without the help of the Commission. his girlfriend. The Victim's brother punched her in the face and repeatedly slammed her face into the pavement. The Victim was seriously injured as the result of the assault. Her injuries included a broken nose, a right orbital fracture with interorbital hemorrhage and loss of vision in her right eye. The Victim's eyeball had to be removed as a result of her injuries, leaving her disfigured. Surgical bills in the amount of \$16,629.00 were covered by the Victim's medical insurance; however, her medical insurance carrier did not provide coverage for a prosthetic eye. The Commission provided \$3,200.00 in compensation

to cover the cost of the prosthetic eyeball.

Case #2 – Catastrophic Medical Expenses (medical expenses in excess of the statutory maximum award of \$20,000.00)

The Victim was assaulted and stabbed by a male acquaintance. The Victim's injuries included stab wound to the right chest and forearm, resulting in the complete transaction of his right radial artery. The Victim did not have medical insurance at the time of the assault and did not qualify for Quest medical benefits. The Victim was treated by seven medical providers and his total medical expenses were \$44,936.76. The Commission negotiated with the Victim's various medical providers to convince each of them to accept a proportionate share of the Commission's maximum allowable payment of \$20,000.00, as payment in full.

Case #3 – Child Sexual Assault

The Victim was sexually assaulted by her father over a five year period, beginning when she was eight (8) years old. The Victim received mental health counseling services at the Sex Abuse Treatment Center. Her treatment was not covered by her medical insurance. The Commission provided \$3,402.88 in compensation to cover the Victim's mental health counseling services.

Case #4 – Visitor Crime Victim

The Victim was visiting Hawai'i on his honeymoon. He and his wife were camping at a public beach park when he was assaulted by unknown male(s) who repeatedly punched him in the face. The Victim sustained multiple facial fractures, including a fractured left orbit and a depressed tripod fracture of the left zygomatic arch. The Victim required surgery and the implantation of two metal plates to stabilize the left orbital The Victim's medical expenses totaled \$9,310.44 of which \$7,591.17 was covered by

medical insurance. The Commission provided \$1,719.27 in compensation to cover the Victim's remaining medical expenses.

Commission Projects

Mass Violence and Terrorism Response Project

In 1999, an employee of a national copier company murdered six co-workers in Honolulu. In the aftermath of this tragedy, the Commission identified three primary constraints that limited its ability to assist survivors of incidents of mass violence and terrorism. First, the Commission did not have the statutory authority to provide compensation for mental health counseling to surviving family members, witnesses, or individuals who worked or were schooled at the scene of this type of incident. Second, compensation and victim services were not integrated into the County and State Incident Command Response Model for

responding to mass violence and terrorism. Third, compensation and victim services efforts were not coordinated with the members of VOAD. These constraints limited the ability of the Commission, and the Victim Witness Programs, to respond to the immediate needs of victims and survivors of, and witnesses to, these types of mass casualty events.

The first constraint was addressed when the Commission initiated and supported legislation to authorize the disbursement of compensation to fund mental health counseling services for surviving family members, witnesses, and individuals who worked or were schooled at the scene of an incident of mass violence or terrorism. In 2000, the Legislature enacted legislation authorizing the Commission to provide compensation for mental health counseling services to the victims and survivors of, and witnesses to, mass violence and terrorism incidents.

The second constraint began to be addressed when the Commission and representatives from various Federal, State, and County law enforcement agencies met to develop a strategy to integrate the Commission and the Victim Witness Assistance Programs into the existing

The September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks has a profound effect on the victim service community – one that forced providers to look at terrorism, and their response to it, in new ways. The unprecedented level of victim need overwhelmed established emergency response plans and protocols. State compensation programs struggled to determine who was eligible for payments and to process claims, and few service providers felt adequately prepared to deal with the number of people afflicted by grief and posttraumatic stress disorder.

Command Response Model. Meetings in each of the counties brought together County and State incident command response agencies, the United States Attorney, the State of Hawai'i Department of the Attorney General, the four County Victim Witness Programs, and the Commission to discuss the integration of compensation and victim services into the command response model. Meeting participants recognized that the incident command agencies had already developed protocols for dealing with mass violence and terrorism. While everyone agreed that the most effective strategy would be to build compensation and victim assistance protocol around the existing Command Response Model, Commission and the Victim Witness Assistance Programs have not yet been fully integrated into the

protocol. The Commission continues to work towards eliminating this constraint.

The third constraint is being addressed through increasing the Commission's involvement with VOAD. The mission of VOAD is to coordinate the efforts of its members in responding to disasters, so that survivors receive timely and appropriate assistance in a manner that maximizes resources and limits duplication of services. VOAD members coordinate, plan, and practice responding to disasters. Members include, among others: the American Red Cross; Aloha United Way/211; the Federal Emergency Management Agency, Habitat Hawai'i; Helping Hands Hawai'i; the Salvation Army; and representatives from the faith-based community.

The Commission further increased its ability to respond to the needs of mass violence and terrorism survivors by creating new links on the Commission's web page that enable survivors to access information in thirteen (13) different languages about how to help parents and children deal with trauma. The Commission and the Hawai'i Information Consortium, which administers the State website, also developed a protocol to distribute real-time information through the Commission's web page to survivors and the public about where to seek assistance in the event of an incident of mass violence or terrorism.

The Commission and other stakeholders will continue their collaborative efforts to ensure that the needs of victims, survivors, and witnesses will be met in the event of another incident of mass violence or terrorism in Hawai'i.

Medical Expense Reduction Project

The Commission initiated the Expense Reduction Project in FY06 to reduce overall medical expenses for uninsured victims of violent crime. Many uninsured victims of violent crime suffer financial hardship as a result of the medical expenses incurred for the treatment of their crime-related injuries. Compensation available from the Commission for medical expenses is woefully inadequate to fully



compensate the crime-related medical expenses for uninsured crime victims who are seriously injured as a result of violent crime.

Compensation for crime-related medical expenses is limited under Section 351-62(b), Hawai'i Revised Statutes, to a maximum of \$20,000.00 in cases involving compensable medical expenses for catastrophic injuries. This limit is easily exceeded when a violent crime victim is hospitalized for more than several days. Many crime victims who are uninsured fall into the gap group who make too little money to afford health insurance, and too much money to qualify for Quest medical insurance. In one of our recent cases, the crime victim, whose medical bills exceeded \$83,000.00 (treatment for gunshot wounds) was unable to qualify for medical insurance from Quest because he made \$588.00 in the month he was shot. While he met the income requirement of less than \$918.00 per month to qualify for medical insurance coverage through Quest, because the enrollment ceiling for that month had been exceeded, he could only qualify if his income did not exceed \$418.00.

The Commission has taken a two-pronged approach to this issue:

1. Medical Expenses Do Not Exceed the \$20,000.00 Statutory Limit

The Commission requests that medical providers accept 70% payment from the Commission as payment in full for their services. In this way, the Applicant is not responsible for the remaining 30% of the expenses, and the Commission retains more funds to benefit other crime victims.

2. Medical Expense Exceed the \$20,000.00 Statutory Limit

The Commission leverages the \$20,000.00 maximum payment against the full amount of the medical expenses owed by the Applicant by requesting that the medical providers accept the Commission's payment as payment in full. This has enabled the Commission to leverage the \$20,000.00 maximum available for compensable medical expenses to benefit the Applicant by not having any balance due.

While not all medical providers in the cases selected for the Expense Reduction Project agreed to take a reduced payment as payment in full, in the Expense Reduction Project cases where the Commission was successful, crime victims realized savings of more than \$107,700.00 from medical bills of more than \$271,000.00 in the aggregate, a savings of almost 40%.

"...in the criminal justice system, the victim of crime is almost always neglected. By requiring the convicted person to make restitution and reparation to the victim, justice is served. In so doing, the criminal repays not only "society" but the persons injured in the criminal's act. There is a dual benefit to this concept: the victim is repaid for his loss and the criminal may develop a degree of self-respect and pride in knowing that he or she righted the wrong committed."

Sen. Stand. Comm. Rep. No 789, in 1975 Senate Journal @1132, commentary on the Senate's intent in passing HRS section 706-605(1)(e) which authorizes Courts to order restitution.

In 1975, Section 706-605(1)(e), Hawai'i Revised Statutes, was enacted to provide the Courts with specific statutory authority to order defendants to make restitution payments to cover the

economic losses suffered by the victims of their crime. Since the passage of this provision, a significant number of victims have not received the court-ordered restitution that they are entitled to. Victims have found it particularly difficult to recover court-ordered restitution from sentenced felons² and parolees.

The Judiciary previously processed restitution payments for all offenders, including inmates and parolees. For a decade, the Judiciary made efforts to divest itself of the responsibility for processing restitution payments made by inmates and parolees. During this time period, the Judiciary and the Department of Public Safety ("PSD") had been at an administrative stalemate over who had the responsibility to process restitution payments made by inmates and parolees.

The system that was created to process court-ordered restitution payments was not working. In order to open a restitution account for an inmate or parolee, the Judiciary required the name and address of the victim before they would accept any restitution payments. This procedure created a significant barrier to the payment of restitution by inmates and parolees. In many cases it was difficult or impossible for PSD and the Hawai'i Paroling Authority (the "Paroling Authority") to secure the name and address of the victim. Victim service providers were understandably uncomfortable about giving the names and addresses of domestic abuse, sexual assault, and other crime victims to PSD and the Paroling Authority. They were concerned that victim safety would be jeopardized if an inmate or parolee inadvertently saw the name and address of their victim in their file.

Despite numerous meetings between the Judiciary, PSD, the Paroling Authority, and victim service providers, and several false starts, efforts to resolve this issue ultimately failed until the Commission stepped forward. With the support of the PSD Director, the Paroling Authority, and the Honolulu Victim Witness Kokua Program, the Commission initiated a pilot project to accept responsibility for the collection and disbursement of restitution paid by inmates and parolees.

On January 1, 2003, the Commission initiated the pilot Restitution Project to collect and disburse restitution paid by inmates and parolees. The Commission has opened over 2,000 restitution

cases and collected over \$383,000.00 in restitution to disburse to crime victims from January 1, 2003 through June 30, 2006. Information identifying the whereabouts of crime victims is kept confidential so that the safety needs of victims are being met. The barriers that made it difficult for PSD and the Paroling Authority to open

restitution accounts at the Judiciary have also been eliminated. PSD and the Paroling Authority need only send restitution payments to the Commission. The Commission and the County Victim Witness Programs locate the crime victim, and the Commission disburses the restitution payment to the victim.

A functional Restitution Project benefits all involved. It is now easy for Parole Officers to increase the accountability of offenders by having them repay the crime victim they injured. This Project also assists the County Victim Witness Programs in their efforts to restore the crime victims they serve. In some cases where the Commission provided awards to crime victims for medical, mental health, or funeral costs, the Commission is reimbursed those funds, allowing more crime victims to be helped³.




Restitution collection from inmates and parolees⁴ has increased significantly over the life of the Project. In the first year of the Restitution Project the Commission collected more than \$46,000.00 and in the third year, the Commission collected more than \$150,000.00. The Commission believes that the significant increase in restitution collections over the life of the Restitution Project reflect the gradual institutionalization of restitution assessment and collection by the correctional facilities and the Paroling Authority.

³ Section 706-646(2), Hawaii Revised Statutes, provides, in part, that the court shall order restitution to be paid to the crime victim compensation commission in the event that the victim has been given an award for compensation under chapter 351.

The Restitution Project has unexpectedly resulted in an increase in the collection of Compensation Fees from parolees. In the first year of the Project the Commission collected more than \$2,000.00, and in the third year the Commission collected more than \$13,000.00 in Compensation Fees. While the Paroling Authority has authority to collect Compensation Fees from a parolee, the correctional facilities do not have statutory authority to garnish inmate wages to pay court ordered Compensation Fees. The Commission will request that the Legislature consider a bill during the 2007 legislative session to address this inconsistency.



The Commission is committed to continuing the Restitution Project as it has resulted in win-win results for crime victims and all of the agencies involved in the effort. The Commission will request that the Legislature make the Restitution Project permanent by the establishment of a permanent position count.

National Association of VOCA Assistance Administrators Strategic Planning Project

Hawai'i is one of six states that participated in the National Association of VOCA Assistance Administrators Strategic Planning Project⁵. The Commission collaborated with various Federal and State agencies and community partners in conducting meetings to develop a statewide Strategic Plan for Victim Services to enhance the delivery of victim services to underserved victim populations. Meeting participants identified underserved victim populations and set performance goals directed towards meeting the needs of those populations. Stakeholders and community partners met in focus groups in all four counties, and on six islands, statewide. Focus group participants worked to identify the needs, gaps in services, systemic issues, and solutions to problems in providing services to underserved crime victim populations.

The Strategic Plan was published by the University of Hawai'i Public Policy Center in October of 2005. The Strategic Plan identified four underserved crime victim populations: elderly persons; immigrants or persons with limited English language proficiency; persons with disabilities; and visitors to Hawai'i. One of the objectives of the Strategic Plan is to enable individuals from agencies to better serve the target populations. To that end the Commission participated in the Visitor Crime Awareness Training Conference in FY06 and in the 2006 Disabilities Access Conference.

The Commission also continued to work with the Victim Witness Kokua Services Division of the Honolulu Department of the Prosecuting Attorney ("Victim Witness"), and the VASH to ensure that visitor crime victims have timely access to compensation to cover their crime-related expenses. VASH and Victim Witness help visitor crime victims apply for compensation before they return home, and they obtain necessary medical authorizations from the visitor needed by the Commission to process compensation claims. The Commission, VASH, and Victim Witness work together to expedite claims when victims have an immediate need for assistance and/or compensation. VASH and Victim Witness representatives are available to assist visitor crime victims twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

The Commission and members of the Strategic Planning Subcommittee on Visitor Victims of Crime, in collaboration with VASH and the Department of the Attorney General Criminal Justice Data Center, developed a protocol to expedite the replacement of personal identification documents for visitors who have their personal identification stolen. Every day across Hawaii a number of visitors have their personal identification stolen. Without personal identification, the visitor may not be able to continue on with their vacation plans because it is difficult for them to rent a car, visit a federal monument, buy an alcoholic drink, or be cleared by airport security to board a flight to return home.

The Commission is committed to achieving the goals articulated in the Strategic Plan so that it can meet the needs of the four underserved crime victim populations: elderly persons; immigrants or persons with limited English language proficiency; persons with disabilities; and visitors to Hawai'i.

Assessment and Collection of the Mandatory Crime Victim Compensation Fee

In 1998, the Legislature created the mandatory crime victim Compensation Fee to provide a funding base for the Commission to become fiscally self-sufficient. The Compensation Fee is mandatory and must be assessed by judges against every offender who is convicted of, or who enters a deferred plea (DAG/DANC) to, a petty misdemeanor, misdemeanor, or felony, and is able to pay the fee.⁶

Since the Compensation Fee was enacted, the Judiciary has neglected to order and collect Compensation Fees, as provided for in the statute, resulting in a Revenue Collection Shortfall exceeding one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00). In the first year that the Compensation Fee was mandated (FY99), the Judiciary assessed and collected less than half of the Fee revenue that was anticipated. While the Judiciary estimated Compensation Fee revenue of \$844,913.00 for FY99, less than \$300,000.00 was actually collected. In FY01, the Judiciary estimated Fee revenue at \$969,131.25 while only \$650,562.75 was collected, and in FY02, the Judiciary estimated Fee revenue at \$778,262.00 while only \$649,005.48 was collected.


The Commission received \$763,424.80 in Fee revenue from the Judiciary in FY03, \$817,075.41 in FY04, \$818,929.02 in FY05, and \$826,810.43 in FY06.

⁶ Section 351-62.6, Hawai'i Revised Statutes, provides that the court shall assess a Compensation Fee against every convicted offender, or offender who enters a deferred plea, and who is or will be able to pay the Fee. Fees are assessed as follows:

^{1.} a \$30 fee for a petty misdemeanor;

^{2.} a \$55 fee for a misdemeanor; and

^{3.} a \$105 to \$505 fee for a felony.

Achieving, and maintaining, a consistent and adequate source of non-tax revenue to underwrite the costs of compensating crime victims, and to pay operating expenses, remains the most important issue facing the Commission. The Commission has not received any general funds from the State for several budget cycles, and now relies solely on non-tax revenue and matching federal funds. The primary source of non-tax revenue for the Commission is the Compensation Fee.

Despite the Legislative mandate, some judges do not assess the Compensation Fee in all eligible cases. The impact of the Revenue Collection Shortfall, created by the failure of some judges to order the Compensation Fee in all eligible case since the Compensation Fee was enacted, is to deprive the Commission of its ability to ensure adequate compensation to victims of violent crime in Hawai'i.

While the Commission was hopeful that court monitoring efforts and numerous meetings with high level judiciary staff would result in a meaningful increase in Compensation Fee revenue, there still remain a significant number of eligible cases where some judges did not order the Compensation Fee. To address and diminish the Revenue Collection Shortfall, the Commission was compelled to request an increase in the amount of the Compensation Fee by ten dollars (\$10) in all crime categories during the 2005 legislative session. Act 144 of 2005 session increased the Compensation Fee by five dollars (\$5) in all crime categories.

While the Commission estimated an increase in Compensation Fee revenue⁷ in FY06 of \$118,600 from the five dollar Compensation Fee increase, revenue only increased by \$7,881.41.

⁷ The Commission used caseload data from the Judiciary's 2006 Annual Report Statistical Supplement in estimating the projected increase in revenue from the five dollar Compensation Fee increase.

In order to determine whether the unexpectedly modest increase in Compensation Fee revenue was related solely to a reduction in the number of eligible criminal cases, or continued failure of some judges to order the Compensation Fee in all eligible cases, the Commission conducted a limited court monitoring survey at District Court and at Family Court. The survey suggested that the small increase in overall Compensation Fee revenue is directly related to the continuing failure of some judges to order the Compensation Fee in all eligible cases, rather than any significant reduction in the number of criminal cases eligible for Compensation Fee assessment.

During the Commission's recent court monitoring, the following situations were observed: 1) one Family Court judge waived the Compensation Fee in eleven (11) cases where the offender had private counsel (presence of private counsel indicates that the offender has the ability to pay the Compensation Fee); 2) two District Court judges ordered fines with lower statutory priority than the Compensation Fee, while waiving the Compensation Fee; 3) one District Court judge waived the Compensation Fee for an offender who later informed the Commission's court observer that he would be able to pay the Compensation Fee when he got paid at the beginning of the next month; and 4) a court staff member informed the Commission's court observer that a judge in a recent case waived the Compensation Fee, noting that he did not know what the Compensation Fee was, so he was not going to order it.

The Commission will continue to monitor the incidence of the assessment and collection of the Compensation Fee by the Judiciary. Dedicating resources to continued court monitoring is necessary to ensure that there is sufficient funding to provide adequate compensation to violent crime victims in Hawai'i, and to ensure fiscal self-sufficiency of the Commission.



Conclusion

For the past 39 years, the Commission has provided enhanced levels of service every year to the victims of violent crime. The Commission has streamlined case processing by increasing management efficiency, reducing case backlog, cultivating strategic partnerships with other public and private agencies, and making significant progress towards fiscal self-sufficiency. Even with all of

these improvements, the Commission will maintain, for the foreseeable future, its pursuit of strategies to further improve services to crime victims.

The Commission will continue to diligently pursue its mission to mitigate the costly and emotionally devastating impact of violent crime on citizens and visitors through continued collaborative efforts, further improvements in management efficiency, and strong staff commitment.
