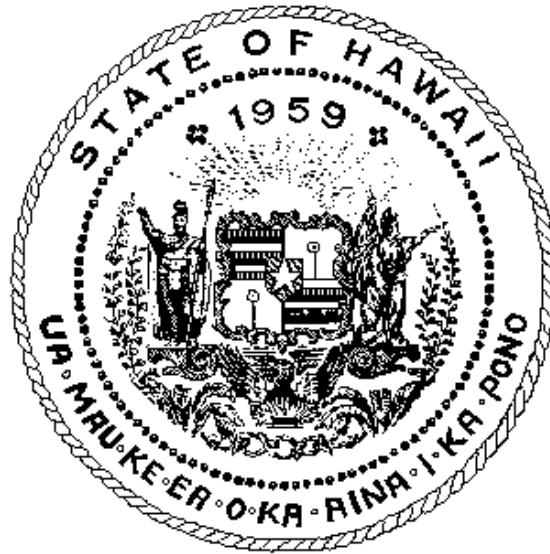
Dear President Kouchi, Speaker Saiki, and Members of the Legislature:

INTRODUCTION

In 2010, the Twenty-Fifth Legislature passed Act 193 with the purpose of authorizing the Department of Public Safety (PSD) to offer reentry/reintegration programs within Hawaii's correctional facilities that included cognitive-behavioral therapy with cultural and other interventions. The legislative intent of these programs was to promote the successful transition of offenders from incarceration to the community by addressing domestic violence, addictions, self-mastery through identity and community connections.

PSD was unable to implement new contracts for reentry/reintegration programs that included cognitive-behavioral therapy with cultural and other interventions. PSD was able, however, to continue with the provision of intervention programs to address reentry/reintegration during FY 2019 with previous allocations for cognitive-behavioral programs that focused on self development, substance abuse treatment and/or sex offender treatment.

EDUCATION PROGRAM SERVICES

General Course Descriptions/Criteria

Self Development Programs focus on personal change and personal growth. Programs in this group include Cognitive Skills, Creative Writing, Explorations, Parenting, Hawaiian Studies, Language and Culture, Yoga, Toastmaster, and Career and Technical Education.

Criteria: Cognitive Skills require a reading level at grade point 6.0 as determined on the Test of Adult Basic Education. Parenting is open to all students who are custodial parents. All other self-development courses are open to any interested students referred to the course by their case managers.

Cognitive Restructuring Programs

Lifestyles. A 12 week program of self-change that meets the cognitive skills requirement. It teaches criminal thinking intervention, motivation building, goal setting, thinking skills, and learning thinking errors, making critical choices, and obtaining a discharge plan.

Thinking for a Change 4.0 (T4C) is an integrated cognitive behavioral change program authored by Jack Bush, Ph.D., Barry Glick, Ph.D., and Juliana Taymans, Ph.D., under a cooperative agreement with the National Institute of Corrections (NIC). T4C incorporates research from cognitive restructuring theory, social skills development, and the learning and use of problem solving skills.

Transformations. A program based on research demonstrating that antisocial thoughts and cognitive skill deficits area causally related to criminal behavior. It targets these antisocial thoughts and skill deficits by using a behavioral approach that includes modeling, rehearsing and rewarding. It is not for substance abuse treatment. This program could not take enough participants due to the limitations set by the Contract.

SUBSTANCE ABUSE TREATMENT SERVICES

PSD began assigning inmates to substance abuse treatment levels on July 1, 2009, by utilizing LSI-R/ASUS summary score results. This was accomplished after implementing an Intensive Outpatient Program (IOP) at Halawa and Waiawa Correctional Facility for moderate risk offenders. With the implementation of IOP, PSD is able to provide three levels of separate and specific substance abuse treatment for low, moderate, and high-risk sentenced male and female felons including ancillary services to promote continuity within the system. This system continues today.

General Treatment Description

Outpatient Substance Abuse Treatment

The Women's Community Correctional Center (WCCC), Halawa Correctional Facility (HCF), Kulani Correctional Facility (KCF), Waiawa Correctional Facility (WCF), Kauai Community Correctional Center (KCCC), and the Maui Community Correctional Center (MCCC) offer contracted, outpatient substance use treatment services through with Salvation Army's Addiction Treatment Services (ATS).

Outpatient services provided at KCF are provided by State civil service personnel.

Outpatient services utilize a cognitive-behavioral treatment component lasting approximately 40 to 60 hours, meeting at least once per week. An evidence-based, cognitive-behavioral therapy curriculum is utilized by these programs. Outpatient services are for inmates who are at low risk for criminal conduct and meet diagnostic criteria for substance use disorders. Offenders within this modality of treatment tend to have had minimal disruption in their psychosocial or vocational functioning due to substance use. This level of service may also be appropriate (based on assessment) for inmates who have completed treatment programs in the community or during previous incarcerations but have not been able to consistently maintain their recovery goals.

For FY 2021, there were 192 new admissions and 162 successful completions. Many of those enrolled into treatment are still in programming due to program suspensions and delays related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

Intensive Outpatient Substance Abuse Treatment

Intensive Outpatient (IOP) substance abuse treatment services are provided at the following facilities: WCCC, HCF, WCF, and KCF. Services provided at WCCC and HCF are procured via contract with the Salvation Army-ATS, while services at WCF and KCF are provided by State civil service personnel.

The IOP consists of group sessions ranging 2 to 3 hours in duration. These groups meet at least 3 days per week and are accompanied by monthly individual counseling sessions or more, as needed. The program facilitators utilize a mix of the Change Companies' Residential Drug Abuse Program and other resources from the company that are evidenced-based, cognitive-behavioral curricula. The program duration is approximately 9 months to completion. Each group operates via a

modified, closed-ended group format with a maximum of 15 offenders per group. Assessment, treatment planning, individual and group sessions, and continuing care services are provided for each participant.

For FY 2021, there were 62 new admissions with 43 successful completions.

Women's Intensive Outpatient Treatment Services

The Intensive Outpatient Treatment program consists of 2 to 3-hour group sessions, at least 3 days per week with accompanying individual counseling sessions as needed. Contracted staff of the Salvation Army Addiction Treatment Services team utilizes the Change Companies' Residential Drug Abuse Program, which is an evidenced-based, cognitive-behavioral curriculum. The duration of the program is approximately 9 months to completion. Each group is a closed-ended group with a maximum of 15 women per group. Assessment and treatment planning, individual and family counseling, and aftercare services are provided for each participant.

For FY 2021 there were 15 admissions and 13 successful completions.

Residential Substance Abuse Treatment

There are two Cognitive Therapeutic Communities that operate within PSD; *Ke Alaula* (Women's program) located at the Women's Community Correctional Center and *KASHBOX* (Men's program) located at the Waiawa Correctional Facility.

The KASHBOX acronym stands for **K**nowledge, **A**ttitudes, **S**kills, **H**abits, **B**ehaviors, **O**pinions, and **X**-factors or *Unknown*.

Waiawa Correctional Facility

KASHBOX Therapeutic Community (TC): 52 beds, Operated by PSD's Corrections Program Services-Substance Abuse Services Branch

KASHBOX is an intensive long-term, TC treatment program lasting approximately 12 months. In response to more complex cases, the duration may increase to 15-months, but that is uncommon. Ideal participants for this level of treatment are those assessed as high-risk for criminal conduct and recidivism.

Cognitive Behavioral Treatment and Social Learning Theory are combined to address criminal thinking and behaviors. Participants work through an evidence-based, Residential Drug Abuse Program cognitive-behavioral curriculum. This process assists program participants to learn, develop, and practice skill sets essential to changing criminal thoughts and behaviors while addressing criminogenic needs. The TC provides the environment to safely develop and practice "community is method" skills in a community setting within the prison. As the TC residents live and work together separate from the general population, they are accountable to one another and the group in practicing recovery skills.

The FY 2021 reporting period recorded 27 new admissions and 40 successful completions. The data reflect participant carryover from the previous fiscal period.

Women's Community Correctional Center

Ke Alaula Therapeutic Community (TC): 50 beds.

The program is operated by Hina Mauka through a purchase of service agreement with PSD and is located within the WCCC. The program is an intensive long-term, 9 to 12-month therapeutic community. In response to more complex cases, the duration of the program may be extended to meet the individual's needs.

Cognitive Behavioral Treatment and Social Learning Theory combine to address criminal thinking and behavior. As the TC residents live and work together separated from the general population, they hold each other accountable to practice recovery skills and change their criminal thinking and behavior. Specialized services were also provided in sexual and physical abuse, domestic violence, criminality and other types of gender responsive issues.

Between July 1, 2020, and June 30, 2021, there were 35 new admissions and 11 successful completions. Programming experienced a suspension of services for the greater part of this fiscal period.

Oahu Community Correctional Center, Laumaka Work Furlough Center:

Laumaka Bridge Program is a 64-bed residential substance abuse reentry, work furlough program for offenders who have completed IOP, or Residential substance abuse treatment while incarcerated and fall within the moderate to high-risk range for recidivism. In March of 2015, the number of beds increased from 32-beds to currently 64-beds with the help of federal funding of the Bridge expansion grant. The program provides opportunities to practice social learning, cognitive learning, and recovery skills learned in treatment while transitioning to the community. Family therapy and job development services are also provided as the offender reconnects with family and community resources.

During the fiscal year, July 1, 2020, through June 30, 2021, Bridge experienced 65 new admissions and 50 successful completions. Data reflects participant carryover from previous fiscal period.

Women's Community Correctional Center

The Bridge Program is a residential substance abuse reentry, work furlough program for inmates who have completed IOP, or residential substance abuse treatment while incarcerated. The targeted population would be of moderate to high risk of recidivating. The program provides opportunities to practice social learning, cognitive, and recovery skills learned in treatment while transitioning to the community. Family therapy, psychological, and job development services are provided as the inmate reconnects with family and community resources.

During the period from July 1, 2020 to June 30, 2021, there were 3 new admissions and 6 successful completions. Furlough programs, including Bridge, have experienced extensive COVID-19 related suspension of services, accounting for the lower-than-normal participant rates.

Saguaro Correctional Center

The Saguaro Correctional Center is contracted under the *Mainland Branch* of the *State of Hawaii Public Safety Department* and offers Outpatient and Intensive Residential substance abuse treatment (Intensive Outpatient treatment in a Residential setting) for adult male offenders. Detailed reports may be viewed via the Mainland Branch data reports.
