OBTAINING COPIES OF VITAL RECORDS

BIRTHS, DEATHS, MARRIAGE OR DIVORCE CERTIFICATES

State of Hawai'i Documents

Go to the Office of Health Status Monitoring's Vital Records homepage: https://health.hawaii.gov/vitalrecords/:

- To order certified copies of birth certificates or marriage certificates online.
- To apply for a marriage license in the State of Hawai'i.
- To apply for a certified copies of death certificates.

HELPFUL TIPS:

- Applying online is the quickest way to order certified copies of birth certificates and marriage certificates.
- To avoid delays, pay for your order by credit card. The name on the credit card should match the name of the person making the request.
- Double-check and make sure all of your information is filled out correctly and you provided the correct payment amount. Incorrect information or payment amounts will result in delayed processing times.
- Include a copy of a valid government-issued photo ID with your order (e.g., Driver's license, State ID, Passport).
- Include mother's or bride's birth certificate surname (given name before her first marriage) on requests for birth and marriage records.
- When ordering marriage certificates, include the full names of both marriage partners.
- If you are ordering a certified copy of a vital record for someone other than yourself, you must provide proof of your relationship to the named registrant of the record (e.g., parent, spouse, son, daughter, etc.) by including a copy of your birth or marriage certificate so that a "tangible interest" can be established.
- Provide correct payment by credit card (for birth and marriage certificates: \$12.50 for the first copy and \$4.00 for each additional copy).
- Orders by mail will take longer because the postal service is outside of the DOH's Office of Health Status Monitoring control and most mail orders are missing information needed to complete the order (e.g., missing copy of valid government-issued photo ID, proof of relationship to person's record being ordered, incorrect payment, etc.).
- DOH's Office of Health Status Monitoring does not have access to all divorce records. Divorce records are kept in the court where the divorce took place. Requests for divorce certificates should be directed to the court in which the divorce occurred.
- Death certificates are normally ordered through the mortuary handling funeral arrangements.

WAIT TIMES FOR VITAL RECORD ORDERS

Processing times vary depending on the type of record ordered and the method used to make the order. Your completed request is handled as soon as it is received with the necessary documentation that establishes your relationship to the person you are requesting the certificate for. Please expect up to 6-8 weeks for requests to be processed.

If your call is not answered, please leave a message with the details of your request and the office staff will get back to you. Make sure to leave a message with the following information and the office staff will get back to you as soon as possible:

- 1. Your full name;
- 2. The best phone number and/or email address for you;
- 3. The type of record request you are inquiring about (e.g., birth, death, marriage, etc.);
- 4. The name of the record holder, if different from yourself; and
- 5. The name of the applicant, if different from yourself.

Applications for an Individual or Couple name change can be initiated here. There is a \$50.00 filing fee and a \$5.00 service fee and all fees are non-refundable.

Name change eligibility:

• Only Hawai'i residents are eligible for a name change granted by the Lieutenant Governor of the State of Hawai'i.

• For active-duty military personnel, please contact the Lieutenant Governor's office for further information before applying for a name change.

A name change is not necessary if:

- You are a Hawai'i resident who was married in the State of Hawai'i and declared on your Marriage Certificate that you will be taking your spouse's name.
- You are divorced and your Divorce Decree stipulates resumption of a maiden name or previous name.

COM Connect APP Helps Residents Share Information with Maui County

The County of Maui announced the availability of a new app which will enable residents to participate in community-based reporting from their cell phones/mobile devices or web.

Powered by SeeClickFix Inc. technology, COM Connect (short for County of Maui Connect)

is a place-based reporting platform which allows residents to document neighborhood concerns and improvements alike, ranging from litter and flooding to damaged sidewalks and malfunctioning traffic signals. The app is available for free through most iPhone and Android app stores and is already active.

COM Connect will allow residents to also report community issues, as well as view, comment on and vote to fix problems submitted by their neighbors. Citizens can even create their own "watch areas" to receive notifications about all issues reported in their community, enabling them to follow the progress of all service requests – not just the ones they report.

The Office of Elections is responsible for voter education and the printing and counting of ballots. The County Elections Divisions handle voter registration; mailing and receipt of ballots, including replacement ballots; as well as voter service centers and places of deposit. For more information, contact your <u>County Elections Division</u> or go to the following website: https://elections.hawaii.gov/resources/county-election-divisions/.

Voting Rights: A person sentenced for a felony, from the time of the person's sentence until the person's final discharge, may not vote in an election, but if the person is placed on probation or the person is paroled after commitment to imprisonment, the person may vote during the period of the probation or parole. You can register to vote or update your current registration on Hawai'i's Online Voter Registration system at https://olvr.hawaii.gov/. This list should contain each employee's name, social security number and case number. The CSEA will review the list and provide the employer with changes, if any.

CRIMINAL RECORDS

The public has access to criminal history records through the Hawai'i Criminal Justice Data Center (HCJDC) and the statewide criminal history record information system (DIS-Hawai'i). The Criminal History Records Check is commonly referred to as a "rap sheet" or "police abstract".

<u>Available to the public</u>: Arrest records which have resulted in adult convictions (found guilty) or acquittals or dismissals by reason of physical or mental disease, disorder or defect.

Not available to the public: Non-convictions that are still pending. You have the right to access your own record and to challenge the completeness and accuracy of the information. This is done through a fingerprint check.

TRAFFIC CASES

Most traffic cases in Hawai'i begin when a law enforcement officer issues a citation, commonly called a "traffic ticket." The citation, which is filed with a state court, charges a motorist, pedestrian, or the registered owner of a parked vehicle (the defendant) with committing a traffic offense and requires the defendant to respond to the allegations in the citation.

For more serious traffic offenses where the defendant is physically arrested and taken into police custody, the defendant's court case begins when a prosecutor orally charges the defendant in court or files a written complaint or information against the defendant, or when a grand jury returns an indictment charging the defendant with committing a traffic crime.

TO PAY TRAFFIC VIOLATIONS

- OPTION 1: ADMIT AND PAY You can admit the infraction and pay the amount written on the citation, either
 by mail, using the pre-addressed envelope or in person at any district court. Please do not send
 cash. Imprinted checks or money orders (U.S. dollars only, payable to "DISTRICT COURT") and credit or
 debit cards (MasterCard & VISA) are accepted. A \$25 service charge will be assessed for dishonored
 payments.
- **OPTION 2: PAY BY PHONE** You may pay by telephone by calling (800) 679-5949. You must pay the total of the amounts stated on a citation within 21 days after receiving the citation. Please have your traffic or parking citation number; license plate number; and VISA or MasterCard ready before dialing this number.

This phone payment system is NOT available if:

More than 21 days have elapsed since you received your citation;

Your citation indicates that you must appear in court for the offense(s) charged;

You have appeared in court and were ordered to pay fines, fees, costs, or other monetary assessments; or Your ticket has not been entered into the system. It may take 13 days or longer after the violation occurred for your ticket or case to be entered into the court's system.

If you are unable to make a payment online after the 13-day period or would like to make a payment before the ticket has been entered into the system, you always have the option of paying by mail using the preaddressed envelope that accompanied the citation or in person at the District Court. *Please do not send cash*. Imprinted checks or money orders (U.S. dollars only, payable to "DISTRICT COURT") and credit or debit cards (MasterCard & VISA) are accepted. A \$25 service charge will be assessed for dishonored payments.

• **OPTION 3: PAY ONLINE**— <u>eTraffic Hawai`i</u> is a fast, secure, and convenient way to pay for traffic or parking infractions that are payable without going to court and for which you admit responsibility. Do not use this system if you deny committing the offense(s) you were cited for or wish to explain circumstances mitigating the offense(s).

To use eTraffic Hawai'i, you must pay the total of the amounts stated on a citation within 21 days after receiving the citation. You may pay by VISA or MasterCard.

This on-line payment system is NOT available if:

More than 21 days have elapsed since you received your citation;

Your citation indicates that you must appear in court for the offense(s) charged;

You have appeared in court and were ordered to pay fines, fees, costs, or other monetary assessments; or Your ticket has not been entered into the system. It may take 13 days or longer after the violation occurred for your ticket or case to be entered into the court's system.

If you are unable to make a payment online after the 13-day period or would like to make a payment before the ticket has been entered into the system, you always have the option of paying by mail using the preaddressed envelope that accompanied the citation or in person at the District Court. *Please do not send cash*. Imprinted checks or money orders (U.S. dollars only, payable to "DISTRICT COURT") and credit or debit cards (MasterCard & VISA) are accepted. A \$25 service charge will be assessed for dishonored payments.

If you wish to pay on-line by eTraffic Hawai'i, please have the following information ready:

Your traffic or parking citation; Your license plate number; and Your VISA or MasterCard

OPTION 4: PAY IN PERSON at any district court. Imprinted checks or money orders (U.S. dollars only, payable to "DISTRICT COURT") and credit or debit cards (MasterCard & VISA) are accepted. A \$25 service charge will be assessed for dishonored payments.

Traffic Abstracts & Traffic Court Reports

The Judiciary has two types of certified documents that report a person's traffic case history: traffic abstracts and traffic court reports. Traffic abstracts, traffic court reports, and driver history records are all available for purchase at the Traffic Violations Bureau located at Honolulu District Court and at all other District Court locations.

For a list of District Court locations statewide:

What is a Traffic Abstract?

Pursuant to Hawai'i Revised Statutes (HRS) <u>Section 287-3</u>, a certified traffic abstract shows "all alleged moving violations and any convictions resulting therefrom, arising from the operation of a motor vehicle and any administrative license revocation. Since parking and equipment violations do not appear on the traffic abstract so it is sometimes called an "abbreviated" abstract.

Traffic abstracts are usually used for insurance, employment, and other such purposes.

Traffic abstracts are available at District Courts on all islands.

To obtain an abstract, provide the individual's full name. The date of birth and driver's license number should also be submitted. Providing the date of birth and driver's license number assists the clerk in providing the correct abstract or report, especially when individuals have the same name. If only the name is provided and the search results in more than one record with the same name, the requestor may have to purchase all records with the same name. A release form is required to obtain an abstract of a juvenile's record.

Traffic abstracts may be requested by mail. Include a self-addressed stamped envelope, along with a money order or cashier's check for \$20 (payable to District Court), and the individual's full name, date of birth and driver's license number. The request should be mailed to the District Court in your circuit. Personal checks are not accepted.

Each traffic abstract costs \$20.

What is a Traffic Court Report?

A traffic court report (sometimes called a "complete" abstract) is provided as a convenience to individuals who want a case record history that includes equipment and parking citations in addition to the information contained in the traffic abstract.

The traffic court report is provided only to the individual in person at District Court, after verification of identity with a picture ID. Traffic court reports may not be ordered by mail.

Each traffic court report costs \$1.00 for the first page and 50¢ for each additional page.

Bulk Electronic Traffic Abstracts

Bulk Electronic Traffic Abstracts are available via a service provided by the state Internet Portal.

How long will the case information stay on my record?

HRS Section 287-3 requires that Traffic Violations Bureau abstracts contain "all alleged moving violations." In addition, for state sanctioning purposes, Hawai'i courts must retain at least ten years of information about certain moving violations.

Federal commercial driver's license regulations require that the State be able to report information about drivers from the time the federal law became effective in the mid-1990s. See Federal commercial driver's license regulations require that the State be able to report information about drivers from the time the federal law became effective in the mid-1990s. 49 U.S.C. 31301 et seq. Some of the reportable information must be kept for 55 years.

HOW TO GET HELP FROM COMMUNITY RESOURCES

Here are a few tips to increase your chances of getting assistance & some places with internet access:

- Get & organize your vital documents. Keep them in an easy-to-find place. Most programs require documents that prove your name, address, income, and other information. Call ahead to find out what documents you need to bring.
- Call ahead to find out the program's eligibility requirements.
- Be polite on the phone and in-person. Greet the person, introduce yourself, state your request, take notes, ask questions if you need clarification, and thank them when done. Dress appropriately (clean and neat) when you go to your appointment.
- Maintain communication. Follow through with your appointments. Inform the service provider beforehand if you cannot make an appointment or will not be using their services.
- Be professional and stay calm. If you feel you have been mistreated or are not getting the appropriate help, stay calm, and ask to speak to someone who can help you (example: a supervisor or manager).

Hālawa Correctional Facility

The Hālawa Correctional Facility (HCF) is made up of two separate facilities: a special needs facility and a medium security facility. The special needs facility opened in 1962, as the City and County of Honolulu's Hālawa Jail, and transferred to the State of Hawai'i in 1977. The special needs facility houses maximum and closed custody inmates, inmates with severe/chronic mental illness who cannot be placed in the general population and inmates who require protective custody.

The medium security facility opened in 1987 and is the newest and largest prison facility in the State of Hawai'i. The medium security facility houses male sentenced felons.

To mitigate overcrowding, there are about 1,400 male inmates from HCF that are housed in one out-of-state contracted facility in Arizona.

Among the services offered at HCF are a broad range of education classes, substance abuse and sex offender treatment programs. KCCC offers sentenced felons an opportunity to participate in its Lifetime Stand Program, which provides a structured, paramilitary regimen of marching, drill exercises, physical training, education, and community outreach. The Lifetime Stand Program stresses discipline, perseverance, work ethic, and personal responsibility.

In addition to in-facility worklines, KCCC community service worklines provide a labor force on numerous projects for county and non-profit organizations. KCCC's vegetable farm maintained by inmates, with products used by KCCC's food services unit. Excess vegetables are donated to community organizations such as senior centers.

Kid's Days' at the women's prison – On-site program for mothers in prison to reconnect with their children, through interactive activities for the whole family.

Sunlight Sun Bright (SLSB)and Star Light Star Bright(SLSB)

– Sunlight during the summer months, and Starlight, during the winter, sponsored by the Catholic Diocese of Honolulu, Office for Social Ministry(OSM), various parishes, the Marianist Lay Community, O'ahu Going Home Consortium (OGH) and Prison Ministry. SUPPORTING WOMEN IN PRISON – courses, events and activities

Pre-Transition Course – A 12-week curriculum focused on life success planning for women about to exit prison, with connections to resources to address their individual needs. Pūʻā Foundation began the course at WCCC in May 2014 and at the Federal Detention Center (FDC) in January 2016, which continues to this date. The curriculum and coursework has been approved and accepted by the U.S. Bureau of Prisons.

Resource Fair – In partnership with WCCC, community partners, and the Chaplain service providers, Pūʻā Foundation helps to organize these events to give the women of WCCC an opportunity to connect with community resources that can support them upon release. The first resource fair was held in 2016.

Cultural Healing and Well Being Course – A 12-week curriculum focused on sharing Native Hawaiian culture and history. Pūʻā Foundation's community educational resources are used in the class – Ua Mea Ke Ea Textbook and DVD. As part of the class and working with other courses at WCCC, the Foundation has been sponsoring the Hoʻike Huliʻau event.

Hōʻike means – to show, exhibit and Huliʻau means – turning point, time of change. This is an annual event that highlights transformations through personal stories shared by the women from the various courses or activities they have participated in. There is a showcase of talents of dance, singing, music and storytelling. Pūʻā Foundation organizes a community gathering and provides dinner before the main event. The first Hōiʻke Huliau was presented was 2013.

SUPPORTING WOMEN EXITING PRISON – addressing housing, vocational and professional development opportunities

Mercy House – Is a non-contracted, tangible resource and a collaborative movement providing transitional housing and support for women offenders exiting prison and re-entering the community. The Pū'ā Foundation, the Catholic Diocese, parishes, community organizations and the Hawai'i Paroling Authority have collaborated to establish the Mercy House, with the first resident being accepted in December 2016.

Therapy.

The WCFP incorporates ahupua'a land management approaches, Native Hawaiian traditional and cultural practices and farming best practices. WCFP objectives include: Working Together (Kākou), Healing, Health and Wellness (Olakino Maika'i) and Service (Kōkua). Support is provided for women in prison and those reentering community through 'aina-based healing experiences and vocational skill building. The WCFP is set on 8 acres of land and the produce grown is to be shared with the community homeless and hunger outreach. Women on the workline from WCCC have been participating since 2017.
